

40th Anniversary of the Collins S/Line - A Special Event!



A few months ago, I stopped by Rod's, (KODAS) office to see what our resident HF guru, Collins Collector, Rockwell-Collins museum curator and all around good guy was up to. As is normal for Rod, he was working on a plan. The plan was for an S/Line special event to commemorate the 40th anniversary of the introduction of the S/Line. As they say, the rest is history. Over the weekend of November 7-8, the three

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Collins Amateur Radio Club Stations, WOCXX, Cedar Rapids, IA; W5ROK, Richardson, TX; and W4CRC, Melbourne, FL put on the very successful special event. Of course, what made the event such a success was you, the Collins Collectors! All of the operators of the three stations had a wonderful time. Many of the event operators commented on the operating skills and manners the Collins users demonstrated during some very tough pileups.

There were a few surprises. Most notably that W5ROK came in out front in contacts with 974 using only four operators and operating without a linear. W0CXX and W4CRC had 930 and 900 contacts respectively. We at Rockwell Collins headquarters here in Cedar Rapids have assembled a team to analyze why W0CXX, utilizing a 30S-1, log periodic at 125 feet and 11 operators, was outdone by W5ROK. Among the other surprises was the solar flare that made for some interesting propagation, including a total black out over Texas for a few hours during Sunday morning.




Arlo Meyer WOLBK (co-inventor of the 30L-1)

KWM-1 Theme Day by John Bess, WA5VVT

On Sunday December 6, 1998 the CCA conducted its first Theme Day of this season. The theme was KWM-1 day. During the course of the net, a total of 26 stations were operating their KWM-1's. Every one of these old 1957-1959 vintage radios sounded wonderful. (Note: delivery started in September 1957 and orders were no longer being accepted after March 1959). It has been rumored that only about 250 of these units were produced. However, one of the stations checking into the net said that he had serial number 2116. No other serial number above 1150 was reported. It is known that the KWM-1 was also purchased by the U.S. Government. Did Collins assign a different serial number sequence to these units? Does

anyone know? The 26 stations checking in reported that they collectively owned 54 KWM-1's. Since then, five more have been reported, bringing the number up to 59. Serial numbers ranged from #E-10 (prototype unit) and #11 to 1150 production units and the #2116. We wish to thank everyone who participated in the net and who have provided additional information since that time. If you have any additional information to add, please do so. 
